Title:	Honors Pre-Calculus
Grade Level:	Grades 9-12
Level:	High School – Honors
Length:	Full Year
Duration:	85 Minute Periods
Frequency:	90 Days
Pre-Requisites:	Algebra 2 and Geometry
Credit:	1 Credit
Description:	Pre-Calculus is a course that extends and builds upon topics covered in Algebra 2 and introduces students to trigonometric concepts. By the end of this course, students will be able to solve and graph polynomial, exponential, logarithmic, and trigonometric functions. Students will also understand the unit circle, be able to apply trigonometric identities, and solve real world problems using trigonometric relationships.

Exponential and logarithmic functions are widely used in describing economic and physical phenomena such as compound interest, population growth, memory retention, and decay of radioactive material.

The depth can be modeled by a trigonometric function.

Concepts of trigonometry can be used to describe the apex angle of the cone.
